### PUBLIC NOTICE

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department announces the following summary of regulations and changes for the 2024-25 chronic wasting disease proclamation.

It's illegal to hunt big game over bait or place bait to attract big game for the purpose of hunting in deer hunting units 1, 3A1, 3A2, 3A3, 3A4, 3B1, 3C, 3D1, 3D2, 3E1, 3E2, 3F1, 3F2, 4A, 4B, 4C, 4D, 4E and 4F.

Whole carcasses of animals harvested in North Dakota can remain in the deer unit or may now be transported anywhere in the state. However, carcass waste must be disposed of via landfill or waste management provider. This does not apply to heads dropped at CWD collection sites or lymph nodes submitted for CWD surveillance.

Taxidermists and game processors can also accept intact carcasses of animals harvested within North Dakota but assume responsibility for disposal.

Hunters are prohibited from transporting into North Dakota the whole carcass or parts, except the lower-risk portions, of deer, elk, moose or other members of the cervid family harvested outside of North Dakota.

Thompson told Commissioners there will be a Microsoft Teams meeting from the State to present information for National Flood Plain Insurance. Thompson also presented that Eddy County has a generator that they are looking to give to the city. Commissioners agreed to take the generator. Thompson presented a Memorandum of Understanding for Emergency Management between the City and Eddy County.

Nuisance Vehicles and Yards were discussed. Letters have been sent out, Commission agreed to hold a lottery for the vehicles that haven't been taken care of due to limited space in the impound lot.

Dean Vorland was present as the building is connected to his office. Vorland advised that the two buildings do not share a common wall. Attorney Peterson advised of the legal steps to be taken to deem this property a blighted structure. Richter made a motion to proceed with the demolition process. Dauenhauer seconded the motion. Attorney Peterson advised that a blighted structure can be reminded to fix the listed problems. Richter rescinded his motion, as did Dauenhauer.
