nine inches. Meanwhile, the story over in eastern Eddy County seems quite different.

Tim Becker, who farms about 23 miles east of New Rockford in Colvin Township, said he's currently having one of his more productive harvests.

This year he grew field peas, soybeans, pinto beans, wheat and corn, and with only his corn left to harvest as of Tuesday, Oct. 15, he said this year's yields are looking pretty good.

"Probably average to above average," said Becker about his yields so far. "Our wheat and peas weren't exceptional but they were good. ... Our soybeans have probably brought one of the highest averages we've seen ... and we're just starting our corn, and I think our corn is going to be really good."

As for rainfall, Becker said it was also above average out east, but that they didn't see quite as much rain as New Rockford and the farmers out west did.

Measurements taken about 3 miles away from his land say they've had 18.05 inches of rain since May 1, and he estimates his property got about an inch-and-a-half less rain than that.

Still, they certainly experienced above average rainfall, but as he explained the soil out east is more productive in wet conditions.

"We've got a lot of rain this summer, but there was a stretch in the middle where we didn't really get rain," said Becker. "[Out west] would have probably welcomed that, where we would have welcomed the

rain they were getting.

"It's just differences in soil," he added. "They're a more clay-based, heavier, more productive soil, and we're more sandy over here."

Meanwhile, statewide numbers from the U.S. Department of Agriculture also suggest a fairly positive harvest overall, with most crop progress and conditions in 2024 being better on average than the previous four years.

But even for those whose numbers might be down, there's always something to be thankful for during harvest - as is the case every year.

This year, it's relatively good fall weather and a late frost.

Despite some of his yields being down, Allmaras said good weather has allowed the harvest itself to go smoothly.

"People with wheat or the earlier harvested crops dealt with some bad weather, but since we started on the beans we've had really good weather and

have been able to run fairly constant every day," said Allmaras.

"We were really really lucky to get a late frost or our corn wouldn't have made it, and maybe even some of our beans," he added. "We really haven't had a killing frost yet."

The first hard frost of the year hit Eddy County later that night last Mon-

day, but with most plants having been harvested and corn fully developed, the damage was expected to be minimal.

But as the October nights grow colder and colder, farmers across the county are giving it their all in the final stretch, as they race mother nature to get their crops harvested on time.

Constitutional Measure No. 1 (Senate Concurrent Resolution 4001, 2023 Session Laws, Ch. 597)	Constitutional Measure No. 3 (House Concurrent Resolution 3033, 2023 Session Laws, Ch. 596)	Initiated Statutory Measure No. 5
This constitutional measure would amend and reenact sections 12 and 13 of article IX of the Constitution of North Dakota, relating to the replacement of outdated terminology describing public institutions of the state. The amended sections are summarized as follows: the "school for the deaf and dumb of North Dakota" is changed to the "school for the deaf and hard of hearing"; a "state hospital for the insane" is changed to a "state hospital for the care of individuals with mental illness"; an "institution for the feeble-minded" is changed to a "facility for individuals with developmental disabilities"; and a "state hospital for the mentally ill" is changed to a "state hospital for the care of individuals with mental illness."	This constitutional measure would amend and reenact section 26 of article X of the Constitution of North Dakota, relating to spending and transfers from the legacy fund. The measure intends to decrease the amount of principal available for spending each biennium and clarify the distributions from the legacy fund. The proposed amendments would require transfers and earnings accruing prior to July 1, 2017 to be deemed as the principal of the legacy fund; reduce the amount of the principal of the legacy fund available to be expended during a biennium from fifteen percent to five percent; require the state investment board to invest the moneys in the legacy fund, not limited to the principal; and on July first of odd-numbered years, require the state treasurer to make a distribution of the legacy fund earnings into a legacy earnings fund.	The initiated measure would create a new chapter of the North Dakota Century Code. It would allow for the production, processing, and sale of cannabis and the possession and use of various forms of cannabis by individuals who are 21 years of age or older; direct a state entity to regulate and register adult use cannabis production businesses, dispensaries, and their agents; provide protections for individuals who are 21 years of age or older who use cannabis; provide penalties for violations of the chapter; preserve certain employer rights regarding use of cannabis products by employees; supersede local ordinances that otherwise would prohibit the purchase, sale, use, delivery, or growing of cannabis by or to individuals 21 years of age or older; and provide that fees must be appropriated for administration of this chapter.

Constitutional Measure No. 2 (Senate Concurrent Resolution 4013, 2023 Session Laws, Ch. 598)	Initiated Constitutional Measure No. 4	
This constitutional measure would amend and reenact sections 2, 3, 4, and 9 of article III of the Constitution of North Dakota, relating to initiated constitutional amendments. The proposed amendments would require both constitutional and non-constitutional initiated measures to be limited to one subject as determined by the Secretary of State, who may not approve the initiated petition if it comprises more than one subject; require that measure sponsors be qualified electors; require that only qualified electors may circulate a petition; require petition signers to provide a complete residential address; and increase the number of signatures required to place a constitutional initiated measure on the ballot from four percent to five percent of the North Dakota resident population. Additionally, the proposed amendments would require that constitutional initiated measures approved by the Secretary of State be voted upon by the voters at the next primary election and, if approved by a majority of the voters, voted upon at the general election immediately following the primary election; if the measure fails at either the primary or general election, the measure is deemed failed.	This initiated measure would amend sections 1, 14, 15, and 16 and repeal sections 4, 7, 9 and 10 of article X of the North Dakota Constitution. It would prohibit political subdivisions from levying any tax on the assessed value of real or personal property, except for the payment of bonded indebtedness incurred through a certain date, and would require the state to provide replacement payments to political subdivisions of no less than the current real property tax levies. It would limit the debt of a political subdivision to an amount not to exceed two and one-half percent of the full and true value of the full and true value of the political subdivision; however, by a vote, an incorporated city could increase its indebtedness to four percent and a school district could increase its indebtedness to five percent. It would allow an incorporated city to become indebted in an amount not exceeding two percent of its full and true value for water and sewer projects. It would require a political subdivision incurring indebtedness to provide for annual revenues to pay the debt payments when due and would prohibit a political subdivision from issuing general obligation bonds secured with tax levied on the assessed value of property.
